As I indicated, I would report back to you on the events that took place at The Regional Navy League Conference in Spokane. This council owes a tremendous debt of gratitude to Ron Testa, Carol & Al Meteney and Vern Young who were in attendance. These individuals have for many years been a part of the backbone for our Council. I believe that they all deserve individual recognition for the unwavering support, guidance and wisdom that they provide. Ron Testa, employed by First Command Financial Services, has been elected as The Regional President for the Pacific Northwest Councils. This is a tremendous responsibility given the number of councils, presidents, and personalities with which he must maintain the leadership role. Carol Meteney was elected as a National Director and is our eyes and ears back to national. She has been past president of this council twice and I intend on gaining as much knowledge of The Navy League as possible as long as she continues to be willing. While at The Regional Conference a group of us took a tour of Lake Pend Oreille, Northern Idaho, one of NAVSEAs best kept secrets. One Naval Officer and ninety personnel run this unique site. The world's biggest remote control toys reside here. They have one-third scale models of The Virginia Class and Seawolf Class

submarines. This site is one of the twelve largest and deepest lakes in the world. 1200ft deep, created by a glacier with a flat sediment bottom, and having an acoustic environment second to none is where hull hydrology testing, sonar innovations used by DARPA, and other top secret testing takes place related to making our subs more stealthy. To ensure that this location stays in the Navy's arsenal for test sites, the new electric boats coming on-line are now being assembled in quarter size to test their acoustic signatures. This saves a tremendous amount of money for the Navy as it allows improvements to design prior to production.

In closing, I wanted to once again thank CAPT Dave Buss, CO, USS John C. Stennis for attending our lunch and being our guest speaker. 
Lincoln Comes Home

The USS Abraham Lincoln (AL) Carrier Strike Group (CSG) and embarked Carrier Air Wing Two (CVW-2) supported Operation Unified Assistance, the humanitarian relief effort to aid the victims of the tsunami that struck Southeast Asia.

The CSG was deployed under the Fleet Response Plan in October and was available to transit from Hong Kong to Sumatra in five days to join Operation Unified Assistance.

ALCSG aircraft flew 1,747 missions in support of Operation Unified Assistance, carried 5,711,866 pounds of supplies, including 16,308 gallons of water, and transported 3,043 passengers. More than 200 patients were medically evacuated for further treatment.

"Nobody was tired," said Lt. Eric Kelso, Helicopter Combat Support Squadron (HC) 11. "We were itching for more of it. You knew you were making a difference out there."

Team Torpedo is a hit with the Navy

KEYPORT — Five years ago, a partnership was forged that married public and private industry in Torpedo Town U.S.A.

And national security, the U.S. Navy and Kitsap County's economy are each the better for it, Congressman Norm Dicks commented last week.

A packed house gathered in Keyport Feb. 22 to celebrate an important milestone for the Naval Undersea Warfare Center and partner, the Raytheon Company. The event marked the success of the Team Torpedo initiative, which is being lauded as an innovation in keeping technology current in today's budget-challenged military.

"It's a proud day to be a part of Raytheon and Team Torpedo," said Upinda Dhinsa, vice president of Naval Integrated Systems for Raytheon Integrated Systems. "I'm personally gratified and absolutely thrilled because I have been part of this group for many, many years and it's your success that's allowed us to make great strides in the world of torpedoes."

The impetus behind Team Torpedo began in the early 1990s when tightening budgets were already threatening the Navy's ability to conduct business as usual. Dicks said \$120 million to \$160 million in Naval procurement dollars have already been lost and the result is an emphasis on upgrading equipment rather than replacing it.

"The industry has contracted dramatically in the last decade," he explained.

The Team Torpedo effort began in earnest in 2000 when Raytheon actually moved some of its operations to a formerly empty building on the Keyport base. Not only did the move save both entities traveling expenses, but those involved call the idea a win-win situation because staff are able to collaborate on a more hands-on basis.

"There's no better way to be able to work together than to walk across the street or down the road and be able to talk to one another," said Rear Admiral John D. Butler, Submarine Program Executive Officer for the Assistant Secretary of the Navy.

But the real test of the partnership's effectiveness was in the output. Team

Torpedo was tasked with creating a new generation of lightweight/heavyweight torpedoes — the MK54 and MK48 — that would be better and less costly than their predecessors. The team announced success in its goal when Raytheon was awarded a

\$7.7 million contract earlier this year for full rate production of both for the Navy.

"With the Navy's acquisition budget growing ever tighter, this partnership is an example to the rest of the Navy on how to get the most bang for its buck," Butler commented.


"We're doing the right thing on torpedoes and I'm pleased Keyport is at the front of things with Raytheon," Dicks added. "I'm just pleased it worked out so well."

But beyond dollars and cents, those gathered at Keyport Tuesday praised Team Torpedo for its part in supporting the Navy and its allies. By working smarter, Dhinsa said, Team Torpedo is also helping ensure the safety of men and women in uniform.

"At the end of the day, myself and my group are responding to the end user and that's the war-fighter," he commented.
