Marine Corps Annual Sunset Parade

The brand new Commanding Officer of the Marine Corps Security Force Battalion Bangor, Washington, Lt. Col. Curtis W. Lt. Col. Carlin commented that Marines were always ready and that they were amphibious by training, so that the Northwest mist that accompanied the parade was just fine.

For the second year in a row, the parade was held at the Silverdale Stadium by Olympic High School in Bremerton, so that the public could have easy access. The parade is traditionally held on base.

This Marine Corps Security Force

Battalion, Bangor is the largest in the world. The Battalion has grown to its current strength of over 430 enlisted Marines and over 320 Sailors. These Battalions are independent commands, capable of self-administration, organized to support and accomplish their own particular mission. Marine Corps Security Force Battalion Bangor is in direct support to Strategic Weapons Facility Pacific. Since its reorganization in 1977 the Battalion has been awarded a Navy Unit Commendation, three Meritorious Unit Commendations, and a Commandant of the Marine Corps Certificate of Commendation.
