Northwest Navy Notes: February 2009 Greatness through Service - Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr.

On January 19 we, a Nation and Navy at war, honored a man of peace. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., was a man who changed history. He did more than lead America towards a new birth of freedom and civil rights: boldly challenged our thinking and forced America into self-

examination, helping us to change, to grow, to prosper.

Dr. King once said "everybody can be great, because everybody can serve." Like many of you with connections to the military, be that active duty, retired, veteran, family member, or supporter, Dr. King's belief in greatness through service resonates very strongly with me. As we honored Dr. King on his holiday events around Navy Region Northwest, it reminded me that his



life and his hopes for the future have much to teach America, and the Navy.

Dr. King summoned the best qualities of people from all over our great Nation. He earned respect not only for his practice of non-violence, but also for his steady

courage. He kept true to his mission. The principles for which he fought are those for which we in the Navy fight: we too believe that providing an equal opportunity for service provides an equal opportunity for greatness.

Today's Navy provides opportunities for service, and greatness, in hundreds of ways: earlier this year the High Speed Vessel 2 Swift was in Jamaica, training local defense forces and delivering medical and educational supplies to hospitals and schools;

USS Taylor was in Bulgaria, forging partnerships and enhancing security in the emerging democracies of the Black Sea region; Everett-based USS Rodney M. Davis is underway near South America, countering the illegal trafficking in drugs that enslaves individuals and whole societies; and on January 13th, USS John C. Stennis departed Bremerton for the Western Pacific, and anywhere else it's needed, to win war, preserve peace, or help those in need. The Sailors, Marines, and Coast Guardsman on those ships are, with steady courage, staying true to their mission: they are protecting American freedom, and working for a more secure, stable and prosperous future for the world.

We can all learn from Dr. King's example, take inspiration from his accomplishments, and real difference. The make a Navy Ethos statement reads, "We are professional Sailors and Civilians; a diverse and agile force exemplifying the highest standards of service to our Nation, at home and abroad, at sea and ashore." Our military has for many years been at the forefront of institutions rewarding achievement and ability, regardless of ethnic origin. We're an institution where opportunities are limited only by the individual's goals and talents, not by where they're from, where they worship, or who their parents are. We strive every day at Navy Region Northwest to serve the citizens of our community, our country, and our world. In the words of Dr. King, and exemplified by his life, because we serve, we too can be great.

January Luncheon Delivers Facts



Speaker Kaj Ahlburg address the January luncheon as Dave Thomas looks on in a lively question and answer period after an informative presentation on Terrorism in the Mid East.

Speaker Kaj Ahlburg, who watched the 9/11 attacks from his office window in Manhattan, discussed "Al Qaeda and Islamic Terrorism" to a spellbound audience. The room was packed with 86 members in attendance. Mr. Ahlburg dispelled the myths of the stereotype terrorist. Gone is the myth that the terrorist is from a low economic environment, poorly educated and a loner. Mr. Ahlburg stated the current bio for a terrorist is a person who is well educated, multi lingual, average age of 26 and married with children.

As Mr. Ahlburg listed the goals of previous attacks, the room became very quiet as the reality of the facts settled into each person's mind. The fact that most attacks cost as little as \$50,000 and that many attacks can be financed by local cells is very concerning.

BROLPN Council Members Invited to Ceremony for USS Ohio

In February (exact date to be announced at February luncheon), Commander, Submarine Trident will host a commemoration of the 1000th Trident Patrol. This ceremony marks the milestone of the ballistic missile submarine conducting 1000 successful patrol periods since the first launch of the USS OHIO (SSBN-726) first deployed in 1982. An invitation has been issued for all our council members to attend. There will be more information on the website and an E-mail will be sent to everyone with the final arrangements and date.

Strategic deterrence has been the sole mission of the fleet ballistic missile submarine (SSBN) since its inception in 1960. The SSBN provides the Nation's most survivable and enduring nuclear strike capability. The Ohio-class ballistic missile submarines, built in the 1980's & 90's, replaced older ballistic missile submarines and are far more capable.

The Ohio class constitutes the current evolution of the US Ballistic Missile Submarine. USS OHIO (SSBN-726) first deployed in 1982 with a complement of 24 C-4 missiles. 14 Ohio class SSBNs remain in service and all now carry the Trident II D-5 Ballistic Missile, extending the submarine's reach to more than 4,000 nautical miles.

Comings & Goings

USS John C. Stennis (CVN 74) departed Naval Air Station North Island Jan. 17 to continue its Western Pacific deployment after picking up Carrier Air Wing (CVW) 9 personnel and equipment. The Stennis and CVW-9 will join Destroyer Squadron (DESRON) 21 to form the John C. Stennis Carrier Strike Group (JCSCSG) as they head west for deployment.

The regularly scheduled deployment is part of the Navy's Fleet Response Plan

(FRP), which is designed to allow the United States the ability to rapidly respond with flexible and sustainable force to any global commitment on short notice. "Anytime we deploy, our primary mission is to standby and be ready to support the war on terror wherever that may be," said Stennis Commanding Officer, Capt. Joseph Kuzmick.

The deployment is scheduled to be approximately six months, and JCSCSG will be prepared to respond to the needs of any operational situation. This deployment is part of America's maritime strategy under the FRP to maintain a force of combat power overseas, capable of protecting America's vital interests and insuring regional stability.

USS Nebraska, SSBN 739 (Blue) said farewell to their commanding officer, Cmdr. Matthew Colburn during a change of command ceremony at Naval Base Kitsap, Jan. 12. With the traditional reading of orders and a goodbye to the Sailors he commanded, Colburn turned over his boat and crew Cmdr. Gerhard Somlai. Colburn is expecting to transfer to Fleet Forces Command in Norfolk, Va.

BROLPN Loses a Good Friend and Council Member

Lone Sailor Dedicated May 23, 2009

The Lone Sailor statue, erected on the new Bremerton Breakwater is the figure of a man, seven feet high and made of bronze. His face, religion and ethnic origin are whatever we want them to be. He could be officer or enlisted, male or female. He could be active duty, a reservist, or civilian. He could be standing on any ocean or bay and the sailor could be standing on the fantail of a destroyer, in the engine room of a submarine, on the hangar deck of an aircraft carrier, or in any other special place where Navy people live and work. In fact, he could be any member of the sea services.

In his expression there is a thoughtful look-of loneliness and yet of something more. He is thinking of home and the pain of separation, the challenges that his family faces in making a life without him. But he is also thinking of the task at hand, the mission of his ship or squadron, the ideals of the great nation, which he defends. that each hour of his deployment across the oceans is an investment in that defense. And so his look is also one of purpose: excellent in his work, sure of himself and of his leaders, a man people count on, he radiate confidence and strength.

This is adapted and modified from a presentation made by C.A.H. Trost, Admiral, U. S. Navy and Chief of Naval Operations in 1987 when the original Lone Sailor statue was dedicated on October 13, 1987, the 212th anniversary of the founding of the Navy.

The formal dedication for our Lone Sailor is on May 23, 2009, at 2pm on the breakwater at the Bremerton Marina at Harborside and everyone is invited.
