Northwest Navy Notes: July 2008

"Northwest Navy Notes" is a column written by Rear Adm. James A. Symonds, Commander, Navy Region Northwest, to provide updates on the operations and challenges in Navy Region Northwest and a review of what is important in the Navy today.

Many of you are aware of the Navy's

"Cooperative for 21st Century Seapower," the new Maritime Strategy (in fact, many Navy Leaguers' input went into its formulation). It talks about new threats, new capabilities, and new missions for America's sea services. As you think about this Strategy keep in mind, that the most basic, essential mission of the Navy is to project power. By their very nature, sea services are the military arm most capable of expanding a country's frontiers, of making wars "away games."

A country's strength is relative to its ability to project its power, be that political power, economic power, the power of information, or military force: we use it to deter war, to respond to crises, to enhance regional stability, and to fight and win wars. Even states with sizable hard power assets, such as a large army, may be able to exert only limited regional influence if they lack the means of effectively projecting their power on a global scale. Our sea services enable America to be THE global superpower of this time. That power we project may be aircraft flying from the deck of USS JOHN C. STENNIS, a SEAL team inserted into hostile territory from an SSGN, or just the existence of the SSBNs patrolling somewhere beneath the oceans.

But while traditional measures of power projection typically focus on hard power assets, "ordnance on target," the theory of soft power notes that power projection does not



necessarily have to involve the active use of military forces in combat. The ability to project forces into an area may serve as an effective diplomatic lever, acting as a potential deterrent, and even influencing entire populations.

America is now threatened less by

conquering states than we are by failing states. Think of it this way... we don't plan and train against enemy battleships sailing into Rich Passage to attack Bremerton. We do, however, have to strategize, plan, and train to the threats posed by countries without governments which may spawn piracy, disease, refugees, and terrorism. Those things have potentially great impacts on U.S. security and stability, and "ordnance on target" may not be the best tool set we have to deal with them. That's where much of our power projection comes in to play: We saw that happen with USS ABRAHAM LINCOLN in the aftermath of the Southeast Asian Tsunami, providing humanitarian assistance in the world's most populous Islamic nation; with anti-piracy patrols we are carrying out near the Horn of Africa; and with the Pacific Partnership deployment of the hospital ship USNS Mercy which is currently in the South Pacific. That kind of power can constrain and mitigate regional conflicts, can protect the global supply chain, and can forge partnerships that last for generations.

Whatever the power needed, your Northwest Navy is operating all around the world to ensure your nation remains strong, and that our future will be secure, stable, and free.

News Flash

The President has signed H.R. 4986. Veterans and active duty military can now salute the flag even while wearing civilian clothes.

The president signed the Amendment to Section 9 of Title 4 of the U.S. Code which was attached with the H.R. 4986 Bill under the National Defense Authorization Act of 2008. The amendment reads: SEC. 594. Conduct by Members of the Armed Forces and Veterans Out of Uniform During Hoisting, Lowering or Passing of United States Flag.

Section 9 of title 4, United States Code, is amended by striking 'all persons present' and all that follows through the end of the section and inserting the following: `all persons present in uniform should render the military salute. Members of the Armed Forces and veterans who are present but not in uniform may render the military salute. All other persons present should face the flag and stand at attention with their right hand over the heart, or if applicable, remove their headdress with their right hand and hold it at the left shoulder, the hand being over the heart. Citizens of other countries present should stand at attention. All such conduct toward the flag in a moving column should be rendered at the moment the flag passes.'



In a March 26th letter, Navy League National President, J. Michael McGrath appointed Larry Salter as a National Director to serve a term until the next Annual Meeting of Members in Kansas City, Missouri, October 31, 2008. Larry will be assisting National Vice President for Membership, Tom Jaffa, on the membership committee—with a special emphasis on recruiting Community Affiliates. Larry joins two other Council Board Members as a National Director-Ron Testa and Carol Meteney.

Larry has been a member of the Bremerton-Olympic Peninsula Council since 2002 when he retired from the U.S. Navy and moved to Silverdale. He became a Board Member in 2003 and has served in the following offices: Board Member; Judge Advocate; Vice President: President: and Immediate Past President. He is currently

Board Member, Membership Chairman, and data base manager. During his tenure as President, the Council's efforts were recognized by being selected as one of 11 (out of 267) Councils for an "Outstanding Council" designation. Monday's Memorial Day Service aboard the Turner Joy was presented by the Bremerton-Olympic Peninsula Council of Navy League. The service was opened with a Memorial Day Prayer by Chaplain Ronald Brown accompanied by Guy Stitt, Council President and Rear Admiral James A Symonds, Commander of Navy Region Northwest.

In Memory of Lieutenant Jeffrey A. Ammon

More than 1,200 Sailors and guests including a delegation from our Council attended the Commander, Navy Region Northwest Memorial, June 4, at Naval Base Kitsap, Bangor, to honor a fallen Northwest Sailor.

Lt. Jeffrey A. Ammon, 37, was killed in an improvised explosive device attack in the Aband district of Afghanistan, May 20. Rear Adm. James Symonds, Commander, Navy Region Northwest said during the memorial that peace does not preserve itself and that freedom isn't free, and added that the work of building a better tomorrow for all humanity entails sacrifice. Tragically, that sacrifice has touched the Northwest Navy family, said Symonds. We lost a shipmate and a friend, a Sailor working to preserve peace, to build a better tomorrow for the

people of Afghanistan, and for the people of America.

Symonds went on to emphasize the meaning of Ammon's service. Freedom, opportunity prosperity are precious blessings; they were not left to us in perpetuity, they were not gained without great sacrifice, and they will not be preserved without purpose and without valor, Symonds said. Jeff was working with purpose, working with valor, to maintain those things we hold most precious, and to give them as a gift to a nation not his own. More than 10,100 Navy individual augmentees are deployed on the ground around the world in support of the global war on terror, of which, nearly 1,500 are in Afghanistan.

Ammon is survived by his wife and two sons.

Coast Guard Cutter Sea Devil Commissioned

The newest addition to the Coast Guard fleet was commissioned during a ceremony at Naval Base Kitsap-Keyport, Wash., Friday, June 20, at 10 a.m.

The crew of the Sea Devil is assigned to the Coast Guards Marine Force Protection Unit(MFPU)in Bangor. The Sea Devil will be commanded by Lt j.g. Alanna G. Kaltsas of Cortlandt

Manor, N.Y. Rear Admiral John P. Currier, Commander, Thirteenth Coast Guard District, was the commissioning officer and Mrs. Anne Symonds is the cutter's sponsor.

"Maritime force protection is crucial if our nation's strategic naval assets are to be able to safely



operate in close proximity to vessel traffic in confined bodies of water" said Vice Adm. D. Brian Peterman, Commander, U.S. Coast Guard Atlantic Area.

The mission of the MFPU is to enforce Naval Vessel Protective Zones (NVPZs) for the Navy's SSBN Fleet by leveraging inherent Coast Guard authorities to provide a dedicated and layered force protection capability to ensure safe passage in and out of homeport. MFPUs are teams of vigilant guardians providing fleet security to the U.S. Navy through: deterrence by presence; protection by escort; defense by force; and terrorism prevention through strategic partnership.

The 87-foot Marine Protector
Class cutter has a crew of 10
and a maximum speed of more than
25 knots. The crew of the Sea Devil
will be used to augment the marine
force protection assets in Puget
Sound.

The commissioning ceremony completed the cycle from launching to full status as a United States Coast Guard cutter.

Tanaka Relinquishes Reins of NBK

"I relieve you sir," Capt. Mark Olson said.

"I stand relieved," Capt. Reid Tanaka replied.

And with that, the command of Naval Base Kitsap changed hands.

Olson assumed command of Naval Base Kitsap June 11 at a change of command ceremony at the Bangor Theater. Tanaka left to serve as chief of staff with Carrier Strike Group Five aboard the USS George Washington in Yokosuka, Japan.

Tanaka assumed command of Naval Base Kitsap in August 2005 and reluctantly stepped down from his role as commanding officer of the new submarine capital. "My time at Naval Base Kitsap has truly been a blur," Tanaka said. During Tanaka's time at Naval Base Kitsap, five submarines moved to Naval Base Kitsap. The USS Maine and USS Louisiana, moved from Kings Bay, Ga. to Bangor. The USS Jimmy Carter, USS Seawolf and USS Connecticut also moved to Bangor from Groton, Conn. The USS Ohio and USS Michigan, formerly Trident submarines carrying weapons (SSBNs), were converted and now carry conventional missiles and special operations forces (SSGNs). Tanaka also was in command when the USS Abraham Lincoln, a carrier based

in Everett, spent nine months in Bremerton. "Everybody had to give a little, everybody had to move a little," Tanaka said.

Vice Adm. Robert Conway Jr., commander of Navy Installations Command spoke at the ceremony and said Tanaka never lost sight of the sailors and their family needs. It takes a special leader to succeed in this environment, Conway said. Command is nothing to be taken lightly. Naval Base Kitsap is consistently recognized for its food service, living quarters and environmental policies. Conway said the accomplishments of the base resulted from Tanaka's character and leadership.

Tanaka said Olson is the right man to be commanding officer. Olson told the crowd of

hundred's he was always curious about the commanding officer role and now the job is his. "Be careful what you ask for," he joked.

Olson is no stranger to Naval Base Kitsap. The Minnesota native served as Executive Officer aboard the Bangor-based USS Ohio's Gold Crew from 1996 to 1998 and took command of the USS Henry M. Jackson, also stationed at Bangor, in 2001. This is not an unfamiliar place for us, Olson said.
