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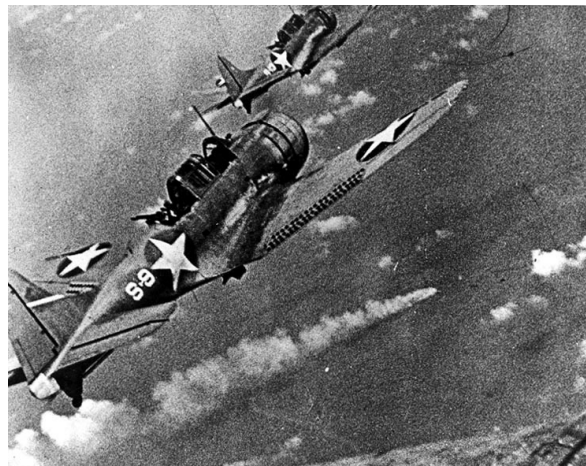
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Battle of Midway July 13 Luncheon Program

Come hear how Admiral Chester A. Nimitz delivered a striking victory in the Pacific near the small island base of Midway, which caused a crushing blow to Japan's swift and overpowering conquest of South

East Asia, starting six months earlier with Japan's surprise attack on Pearl Harbor. This United States naval sea and air victory broke the back of Japanese naval aviation! Japan was forced to change its national strategic philosophy from one of awesome offense to that of desperate defense directly effecting the duration and outcome of World War II.

As Commander of the Pacific Fleet, Admiral Nimitz achieved an incredible

victory through the brilliant use of limited resources, the element of surprise, smart code breaking, dedicated professional naval aviators and pure unadulterated "LUCK". His forces consisting of 27 ships

faced off against the overwhelming Japanese force of nearly 147 ships. With such odds Nimitz was not expected to win.

The intense battle lasted only about three hours concluding with the Japanese Carrier Force Commander, Admiral Nagumo, (the victor at Pearl Harbor) eventually being forced into a difficult tactical position by our dedicated and professional naval aviators from which there was no escape.

President's Message

On Memorial Day, prior to laying the traditional Memorial Wreath over the side of the ship, a warm hearted crowd huddled up in the crew's mess of the USS TURNER JOY avoiding the rainy weather to hear Rear Admiral Aucoin's Memorial Day address along with my reading of General Collin Powell's colorful speech on the "Government Issue" American Soldier, better known around the world as the American GI.

From its World War II roots the term "GI" stands the test-of-time as the venerable "GI Joe"- foot soldier. Today we've added a new acronym to describe our Navy's service men and women... "IA" or Independent Augmentee who stand side-by-side "in country" with the modern day boots on the ground "GI."

The United States entered WWII on December 7, 1941 but our merchant marines and sailors were already in-the-fight transporting Lend Lease War Materials to Europe and later Russia, suffering relentless attacks from German submarine "Wolf Packs" on their convoys. Following the Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor, the war in the Atlantic raged on while adding the equally dire and

overwhelming naval battles in the Pacific to the war effort.

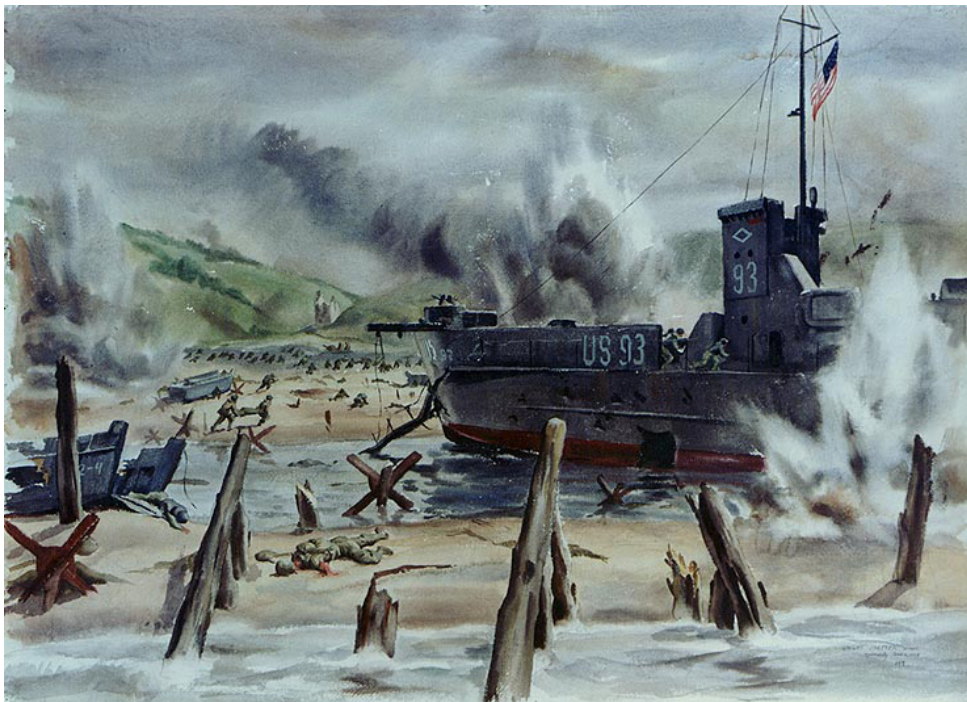
Whether landing on the beaches of Normandy or the coral sands of the Pacific, our Marine "GI's" and Navy Sailors stood in harm's way together, wave by wave, in vulnerable landing craft while shuttling GI's from the heaving sides of a troop ship back to the treacherous beaches again and again.

Today we are fighting in an "Asymmetric" battle space where beach landings have become desert and mountainous roadways where IED's, ambush and suicide bombs face the GI's 24/7 with Navy and Marine IA's standing together with the "GI's", shoulder-to-shoulder, in harm's way.

As the tragic and heartwarming stories of our M16 - Hershey Bar packing service men and women filter home, it's clear that little has changed over the last 69 years ... "let's get the job done and get home safe". Our modern day hero's stand and fight and/or simultaneously perform humanitarian relief services all in the same battle space or natural disaster catastrophe.

How can we ever say "thank you for your service"... enough.

Louis Mejia – Navy League Board Member



A native of El Monte, California, Louis graduated from El Monte High School with honors and joined the Navy soon afterwards. Louis served as a Radioman on seven ships: LCU-164, the Peoria, the Thomaston, Tarwah, Ranger, Whipple and Lahey, enjoying travelling from port to port. The Navy offered him several opportunities to visit the places where history was made – actually seeing

what he used to only read about in books. Awestruck that he could walk on the same ground that battles were fought on, such as the Battle at Corregidor he continues to visit historical sights when he travels.

While the most interesting city he visited while in the Navy was Hong Kong (it seemed like nothing ever closed), his favorite liberty spot was Singapore (a Western city in the middle of the Orient). One of the most unusual duties he had was on board the Ranger. It is notable because Louis is an avid “Trekkie”! Star Trek 4 – The Voyage Home was filmed on board the Ranger. Not only did Louis get to meet members of the cast - he was part of Walter Koenig’s security detail during the filming!

After 23 years of honorable service, Louis retired as a RM1/E6 then went to school to earn two associates degrees to become a lab technician. After several years of commuting, he became a real estate agent with Reid Real Estate in Bremerton so he could stay in the county, where he has been a resident since 1992 and lives with Suwimonm, his wife of 13 years.

Louis joined the Navy League after participating in the Stennis’ change of homeport event in 2002 because he believes in the Navy League’s mission of supporting the Sea Services and has been on the Float Committee and a board member since 2003. Over the last seven years he has seen the awareness of Navy League in the community grow steadily and hopes to do what he can to continue that growth.

He indicated that in many ways this experience of being the commanding officer of one of the 12 largest warships ever made was perhaps the highlight of his career.

His photos of bringing the carrier through the Straits of Magellan were

absolutely amazing.

Rear Admiral Symonds began his career 35 years ago flying jets off an airplane carrier. He and Anne were stationed at Naval Air Station Whidbey for 14 of those years and now he will soon have his retirement ceremony in the same hangar that he reported to in September 1976 as an ensign.

We will miss both of these wonderful people and will remember them for their wonderful leadership in community projects and for being so supportive of the many local projects and activities. They opened their home and their hearts to us. We hope they will maintain contact as they move into the next phase of their lives.

USS Maine Change of Command Ceremony

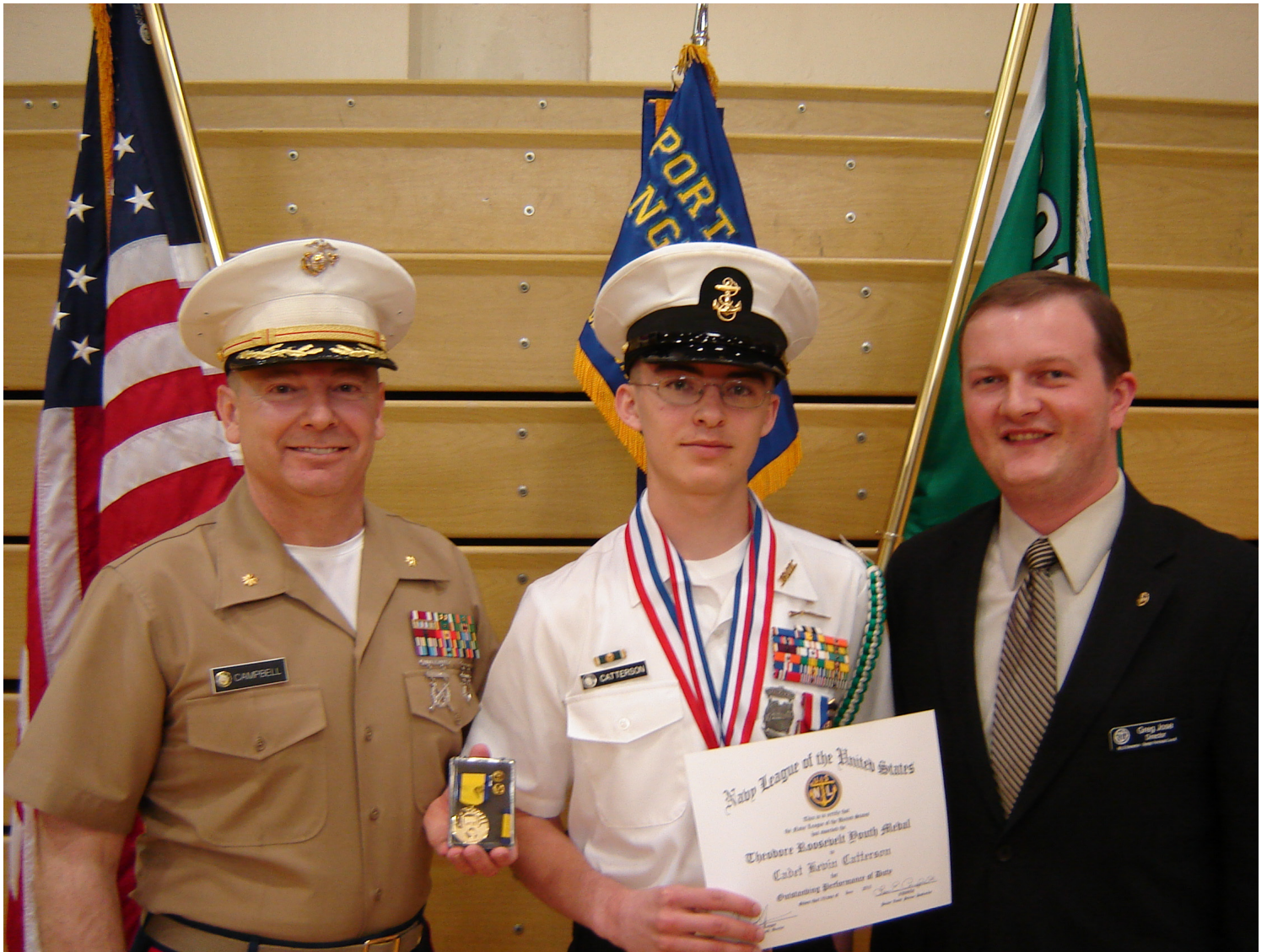
