## Navy League "Tigers" Sail Home

It was indeed the experience of a lifetime.

Late last year Navy League members had the delight of touring the USS John C Stennis CVN 74. We met the Captain, Brad Johanson. This was a fortuitous event, which has developed into a great friendship.

At his invitation, we traveled to Pearl Harbor for the trip home to Bremerton. Before leaving Pearl, Captain Johanson took us on a guided tour of the Harbor (on the Admiral's barge) with a locally stationed sailor as narrator of events at the memorable sites.

After leaving Hawaii, there were several very eventful days. Air ops, the incredible power of the aircraft as they launched & recovered and a supersonic fly by. The sonic boom was VERY impressive! The precision & extreme care with which the crew went about their tasks was a revelation. These are some of the most competent people & carefully planned procedures one can imagine. The following day, the full air show was done in bright weather. Helicopters laid down a line of smoke markers beside the course of the ship. One F-18 came past strafing the ocean along that line. Then 2 F-18s came down that same line dropping 500 lb bombs. We also witnessed an air to air refueling configuration.

The accompanying cruiser from the Task Force, the USS Antietam, sailed alongside a thousand yards or so away, and fired one of it's 5 inch guns several times. A fly

over of 16 of the planes in formation was impressive, too.

On August 27th, 2007 approximately twenty one members and guests of the



Bremerton-Olympic Peninsula Council met at San Diego and were bussed to the USS John C. Stennis on Coronado Island, where we boarded the ship to join the Tigers who had started in Hawaii. Our "Tiger

Trappers" did a great job getting us all to the ship. The F-18's had left the ship so we were lucky to have been assigned their berthing area.

Reveille @ 0600. Time to get up and get down to chow. Getting used to the passage ways on the first day was a feat. When lost you ask a sailor and they set you in the right direction. One "P way" looked just like another. The ladders were a challenge no matter where you went you had to ascend or descend ladders.

We sailed out of San Diego on the morning of the 28th heading for Bremerton. As we proceeded north the Stennis met with a T-AO 187 Henry J Kaiser MSC Fleet Oiler. Both ships jockeyed for position to practice taking on fuel and stores. Both the Kaiser and the Stennis slowed to 13 knots each and stayed approximately 200 feet or so apart for half a mile as a coordinated exercise.

Each day the Stennis tour guides (all first class) would meet us in the wardroom

and off we would go. We toured the bridge (20 stories above the water) to the magazine. The forecandle and anchor chains were something to see. The sailors on the ship demonstrated the CIWS "Sea Wiz" as it is called to all Tigers. We rode the ship elevator up to the flight deck. What a ride. The Sea Wiz is a gatlin gun. They fire up to 4500 rounds per minute about 500 rounds in the three second burst. In those three second bursts there was nothing but a wall of steel flying out for a couple of miles. The ship slowed and launched two targets off the port and starboard side of the ship. The targets appeared to be large red balls and sailors opened fire with the 50 caliber machine guns. Two weapons from each side of the ship and targets didn't last long under the talent of the gunners.

Our group ate in the Officers wardroom. Food was plentiful and between the Starbucks coffee, ice cream and main courses, I'm sure we left the ship with a few extra pounds.

The ships crew preformed a Naval Burial at sea for the remains of 13 retired men and women. Each received a prayer and their ashes were carried by a crewman to the bier for delivery to the sea. A Gun salute was rendered for all that were honored that day. One family who's loved one was laid to rest was presented the flag of our Nation. All families will receive a flag.

On the morning of the 31st August 2007 the Stennis steamed through Rich passage for PSNS and along the way you would see banners welcoming the fighting ship back home. We arrived at the pier at 0930 sharp to the cheers of the families and friends there to meet this Great crew and Ship, welcoming their loved ones back home. It was a sight to behold.

The USS John C. Stennis had an impressive record on this deployment. They set the record for the highest number of promotions in rank of any aircraft carrier. A JCS University program with 4 professors aboard awarded degrees during this deployment. While in the Gulf, the accuracy of their guided ordinance was extremely high which enabled the USS John C. Stennis to assist in defeating the spring offense of the Taliban, thereby preserving freedom for a large section of Afghanistan. Whenever the Taliban came out of their caves to attack the villages, JCS fighter planes bombed them right back in.

We encourage everyone to be at the

meeting Oct. 9, when Capt. Johanson will present a very informative & interesting account of their successful 7 ½ months at the tip of our Nation's spear.

On behalf of the Navy League Bremerton-Olympic Peninsula Council, we would like to say thank you to Captain Brad Johanson for inviting us on board the USS John C. Stennis (CVN 74). Thank you all for doing an outstanding job over the deployment. Welcome home to Bremerton. We love you and "Job Well Done!!!"

# Captain's Corner - The Stennis Returns

This article is the first in a series of new columns written by Captain Bradley Johanson, Commanding Officer of the USS John C. Stennis

Dear friends,

It was a beautiful day on 31 August as we pulled into port in Bremerton after completing our 7.5 months of deployed combat operations with tremendous success. It's wonderful to be home with our friends and families once again.

Our operations overseas included the defeat of the Taliban Spring Offensive in Afghanistan, supporting our troops on the ground in Iraq and sowing regional stability and security throughout the Middle East by reinforcing the commitment of the United States to our coalition partners in the Global War on Terrorism. These operations included the launch and recovery of thousands of missions by our 68 combat aircraft, and the delivery of almost two hundred precision guided bombs. I think the highlights we take the most pride in were defeating an ambush in which the Taliban were trying to kill a group of coalition troops in the southern provinces of Afghanistan and the destruction of two large scale explosive production facilities run by the Taliban in Afghanistan and the insurgents in Iraq. Overall, a tremendous success due to the



superb professionalism and hard work of our Sailors. We are proud to be Americans!

Following our time on station in the

Gulf we had a number of great events on our way home as well, including port visits in Singapore and Hong Kong, participation in the big western pacific exercise Valiant Shield and, best of all, getting to host a "Tiger Cruise" in which 1,450 friends and family members, including many Navy League members rode the ship on segments of our transit from Pearl Harbor to San

Diego to here, our homeport

of Bremerton, WA. What could be better than coming through Rich Passage on a beautiful summer day with friends and family members onboard and even more friends and family members waiting here on the pier to greet us at our homecoming.

The crew of the JOHN C. STENNIS is very happy to be home and very proud of our missions overseas. I look forward to visiting with you soon at our monthly Navy League luncheon. Junay and I are now members of the Bremerton-Olympic Peninsula Council of the Navy League for life!

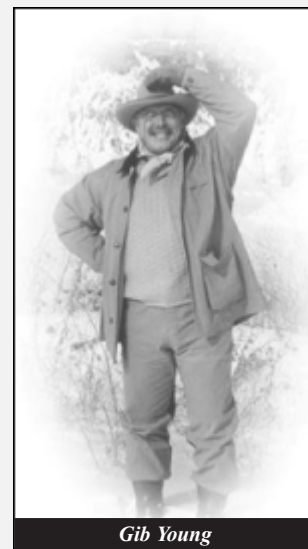
