Rear Admiral Caldwell, Speaker for September 14 Luncheon

While we will all miss Rear Admiral Caldwell and his wonderful wife, Kim, we look forward to having the opportunity to hear him share some thoughts

before he leaves for his new assignment as commander, Submarine Force, U.S. Pacific Fleet, Pearl Harbor, Hawaii. He has become such a welcome part of our community through his extensive participation in so many different activities. He and his wife bring a welcome enthusiasm, humor and joy of life to all gatherings. They both also bring a rich appreciation of history as they both come from a long line of military members. We will always remember the

great presentation on the Great White Fleet.

Rear Admiral Caldwell currently serves as the commander for Submarine Group 9 and is headquartered at Naval Base Kitsap in Silverdale. He assumed this role on August 7, 2009. He is responsible for the readiness, training, logistical, administrative and personnel support of all U.S. Ballistic Missile (SSBN) and Guided Missile (SSGN) submarines in the Pacific Northwest.

Rear Admiral Caldwell received his commission, graduating with distinction from the United States Naval Academy in 1981 with a Bachelor of Science in Marine Engineering. He holds a master's degree in Operational Research from the Naval

Postgraduate School His awards include the Defense Superior Service Medal, Legion of Merit Meritorious Service Medal, Navy Commendation Medal, Navy Marine

Corps Achievement Medal, and the Naval Submarine League's Charles A. Lockwood Award.

Rear Admiral Caldwell served on the USS Boston, USS Alabama, USS Buffalo, and commanded the USS Jacksonville, homeported in Norfolk, Virginia and the Submarine Development Squadron in New London, Connecticut.

Ashore, Rear Admiral Caldwell held a wide variety of impressive positions around the world. He was selected for Flag rank

in 2007 and was subsequently assigned as the deputy commander for U.S. Strategic Command's Joint Functional Component Command for Global Strike in Omaha, Nebraska. The same assignment now held by the officer who will replace Caldwell as Subgroup 9 commander, RDML Robert Hennegan.

Navy League National Convention Jacksonville, Florida Online Registration is Now Available

The deadline for registration is October 1, 2010. Detailed information about the National Convention is online and in the August issue of Seapower magazine. A proxy card is also available in the August Seapower for those members who cannot attend the Annual Meeting of Members.

National Convention Chairman Diane Wright and her committee have developed an exciting program with some terrific optional events. A special opportunity is the Kennedy Space Center tour on Tuesday, October 19, 2010, departing at 7:15 a.m. (cost \$125/ person). During this guided tour of the world's largest launch facility, you will get an up-close look at the coastal launch pads that unleashed the power to put people on the moon and send space shuttles to the International Space Station. The tour culminates at the Apollo/Saturn V Center, home of the largest rocket ever built. As an added bonus, the tour will include personal insights from Mr. Bob Crippen, Navy League Palm Beach Council member, former astronaut and retired Kennedy Space Center Director. Bob was the pilot of STS-1, the first orbital test flight of the Shuttle Columbia, the first true manned winged spaceship. We then were treated to a tour of the Homeland Security office for the area, which is called the Joint Harbor Operations Center. Here is where any disaster or threat would be monitored and where the responses, would be coordinated. There is a great integration between the Coast Guard, Navy, local and state police and Canadian authorities.

The final stop of the day was to see the Coast Guard Museum on the base. It houses

historical displays of the Coast Guard's past, as well as a display on the only Coast Guardsman who received the Medal of Honor in WWII.

The tour left us all with a greater appreciation for all that these dedicated people do to make life safer for America.

US Marine Corps Sunset Parade a Huge Success

For the fist time, the traditional Marine Sunset parade was held at a public venue so that anyone might attend. Over 1,000 people filled the grandstand and the special seating at Silverdale Stadium to watch the Marines and Navy perform. There were many others watching from beyond the fences of the stadium.

Navy Band Northwest greeted visitors with their wonderful music. Marine and Navy members of the US Marine Corps Security Force Battalion at NBK-Bangor worked together to produce a unique parade based upon the strong traditions of the two forces.

The Battalion is the largest Marine Corps Security Force battalion in the world. Since its reorganization in 1977, the Battalion has been awarded the Navy Unit Commendation, three Meritorious Unit Commendations and a Commandant of the Marine Corps Certificate of Commendation.

Thirteen Marines wore uniforms depicting a specific time period in the history of the US Marine Corps. They hope to have a similar display of naval uniforms for the parades next year.

PVT Lucy Brewer II, the new Marine mascot, was presented and awarded her rank.

According to legend, Lucy Brewer was originally a farm girl from Massachusetts, who disguised herself as a man and served as a Member of the USS Constitution Marine guard during the War of 1812.

Civil War re-enactors demonstrated their skills and equipment. Lt Colonel Zachary White and Sergeant Major Smith led some of the events. Captain Mark Olson, Commanding Officer of Naval Base Kitsap and RADM Aucoin also participated in some of the events.

Third Fleet Reception – Seattle



Several members of our Council were invited to attend the Third Fleet Reception that was one of the highlights of Fleet Week in Seattle. Vice Admiral Richard Hunt, Commander of the Navy's Third Fleet hosted the Reception and made us feel very welcome. He is responsible for 50 million square miles of ocean on America's doorstep with a force that is arguably too small for the job. He supervises about 65,000 sailors and nearly 100 ships and submarines in the eastern and northern Pacific Ocean, which includes the Bering Sea, Alaska, the Aleutian Islands and a segment of the Arctic. His mission is to help oppose terrorists, provide naval assistance for the wars in Iraq and Afghanistan, and safeguard American interests in the face of competitors such as China and Russia.

The Reception was held on board the US Green Bay. This ship is designed to carry Marines into special places. It can carry hovercraft and several types of planes including the Osprey. The ship is designed for both fighting and in humanitarian relief efforts. The guests had fun exploring this ship and talking to the Marines and Sailors who serve aboard.

Area Navy League Councils Work Together

Bremerton-Olympic Peninsula Council, Lake Washington Council and the Everett Council sponsored the annual picnic for the Navy ships that come for Sea Fair and Fleet Week.

This year sailors from the USS Kidd (DDG 100 pulled up to NAVSTA Everett to enjoy the barbecue, spend the night and pick up Sea Cadets, Boy Scouts and other VIP's for a trip to Seattle as part of the Seafair's Fleet Week August 4-8.

The USS Kidd is currently homeported in San Diego. It is the third Navy ship named after RADM Isaac C. Kidd who was the first American flag officer to die in World War II. The current USS Kidd deploys with Carrier Strike Group 3.

At the barbecue, everyone had the opportunity to enjoy free food, music and games, inflatable games and volleyball.

This is the third year that our council has been a sponsor and it is a great opportunity to work with the other councils and to help bring the young people together with the sailors to learn more about life in the Navy.
