Three Attend National Convention

Ron Testa, Carol Meteney and Norma Parker from our Council attended the Navy League of the United States 105th annual national convention at Desert Springs beginning with opening ceremonies on Thurs., Oct 1, 2007. The Palm Springs Navy League Council, headed by local businessman John Easton, hosted the four-day event that is brought more than 500 members and guests from around the world.

One of the highlights of the convention was the Sea Services Awards Luncheon on Friday, November 2nd, 2007 where more than 20 Navy, Marine Corps, Coast Guard and Merchant Marine military and civilian personnel received highly coveted awards for outstanding service, particularly while serving in Operation Iraqi Freedom in support of the Global War on Terror. The guest speaker for the awards luncheon was MajGen. John Kelly, the commanding general of the I Marine Expeditionary Force (I MEF, Forward) which is home based at the Marine Corps Base in Camp Pendleton,

Calif.

Other convention highlights included a K9 drug and bomb detection demonstration by the Coast Guard's new special operations unit - DOG (Deployable Operations Group). The demonstration included a static display of a 25' Defender class boat used by Coast Guard dive teams and tactical law enforcement teams to board vessels that are noncompliant or of high interest. Smith and other Navy League members had the opportunity to learn about the current challenges facing the sea services during a panel discussion featuring MajGen. Kelly and senior leaders from the Navy, Coast Guard and the Maritime Administration.

Closing out the convention was the Commandant of the Marine Corps Gen. James T. Conway, the dinner guest speaker. Gen. Conway commanded I MEF during two combat tours in Iraq and later served as the director of operations for the Joint Chiefs of Staff in Washington, D.C.

Hello Dear Friends,

It was a true pleasure during the November Navy League luncheon to honor the courage and commitment of our comrades in arms, the members of the United

States Marine Corps. Over the past 30 years I have had the wonderful opportunity to witness first hand many of the traits of these exemplary warriors.

While assigned to Attack Squadron 145 I had the honor of attending training at the Marines Aviation Weapons and Tactics Squadron One, an absolute center of excellence in training aviators in the art of Close Air Support for our forces on the ground. During my training at Test Pilot School I had the opportunity to train with some of the Marine Corps finest aviators, including members of the A-6 community and Marine helicopter pilots. I also had the privilege of deploying with several Marine F/A-18 squadrons aboard Aircraft Carriers with Air Wings that mixed the talents of the USN and USMC. But I think the time I got to see the most of how the Marines operate was during my command tour aboard USS DENVER (LPD 9), a Marine transport vessel, where we deployed to the Gulf as an Amphibious Readiness Group (ARG). This deployment was specifically in support of bi-national exercises with Jordan and Kuwait, and to show our regional allies how highly we respected our commitments

to regional stability. During this deployment I got to see first hand our Marines in action on the ground in the Middle East and how much they shaped the perceptions of our friends and allies with regard to the professionalism, readiness and war fighting acumen of the United States of America. It was during this time that Al Qaeda affiliated terrorists ambushed our Marines on Faylaka Island, but our warriors gave no ground, and when fired upon they held firm and brought those terrorists to justice. Their dedication is unmatched in the world today. There is no force that can stand toe to toe with our Marines. They are the best, most dedicated and committed fighting force in the world.

The service of our Marines is something we should never ever take for granted. They are the true blue Americans that keep our nation free. They are the exemplary fighting force that we should all aspire to replicate within every service, every organization.
