I am happy to report that Navy League's National Board of Directors unanimously approved the motion to adopt "The Navy League" as the Official Song of the Navy League of the United States.

I wrote the words last spring and worked with Dave Shafer to develop the music. He wrote the music conveying the tune in my head. Dave created an arrangement and eventually recorded it on his "semi-professional" recording system in the basement of his home singing the words to his own guitar accompaniment.

This is the first song I've ever written. Dave was amazing in the amount of effort he poured into this project. Dave convinced me to make a major change in the song by reversing the first and second verses. He explained that starting with the verse "Citizens in support of the Navy" was a better "hook" than "Teddy said to all American Patriots" - which I originally penned as the start of the song. (My experience with "hooks" in the past related to fishing! Carol Meteney, provided key feedback for the



Northwest Navy Notes: The Navy Chaplain Corps: Called to Serve for 233 Years

"The Commanders of the ships of the thirteen United Colonies are to take care that divine service be performed twice a day on board and a sermon preached on Sundays unless bad weather or other extraordinary accidents prevent," reads the second article of the Navy Regulations signed in November, 1775.



From those inauspicious beginnings came an organization as legendary as any in America's armed forces. From the Revolutionary War to the War on Terror, our sea services haven't left home without them. Chaplains marched with Marines to the halls of Montezuma, sailed with Destroyer Escorts across a U-boat-filled Atlantic, and prayed with the dying on Iwo Jima.

Now as never before, America's sea services are a global force, fighting current wars and working to prevent future wars. And as never before, the home front is integral to our deployed fleet and fighters.

The Chaplain core is that strong thread that runs seamlessly through the fleet, the fighter and the family. In the deployed fleet, with the Sailors, Marines and Coast Guardsmen, you'll find a Navy chaplain. Where there's an Aircraft Carrier off the Horn of Africa, you'll find a Navy Chaplain. Where there's a Marine battalion in the mountains of Afghanistan, you'll find a Navy Chaplain. Where there's a Coast Guard icebreaker in the Arctic Ocean, you'll find a Navy Chaplain. Anywhere on land or sea, Chaplains are providing for the incredibly diverse spiritual needs of the men and women of America's sea services.

In this century, the Navy reaches out with a helping hand as much as it does with a clinched fist: the role of providing the helping hand is something at which our Chaplains

During Lt. Fowler's first tour as a Chaplain he changed the lives of thousands of people in an impoverished yet strategically vital part of

the world. He also changed the lives of hundreds of Sailors serving with him in Destroyer Squadron 1. That's a remarkable feat for an individual, but it's fairly ordinary for a Navy Chaplain.

On sea or land, fighting wars or winning hearts and minds, you'll find our Chaplains. Their job has never been easy, and today's operations present special challenges. Nearly 8,000 Sailors are deployed on the ground around the world in support of the War on Terror as Individual Augmentees, or I.A.'s. Those assignments, sometimes without the support that a ship or squadron offers, may present difficult circumstances for I.A.'s and their families.

Where an I.A. is deployed, serving in combat, with an unfamiliar service in a very unfamiliar place, you'll find a Chaplain. When an I.A.'s family feels alone, cut-off from their familiar support network, you'll find a Chaplain. When an I.A. returns, facing the stress and challenges of re-adjustment to home, you'll find a Chaplain.

During wartime, accident rates for service members go up: a more dangerous world overseas can lead to more dangerous behavior for our sailors at home.

Chaplains are the ones helping keep our Sailors and Marines safe on the home front, ready to do their nation's will when called. Their leadership, character, willingness to lend an ear and sincerely care about the Navy family, may be the only difference between a trip back to the ship or a trip to the hospital.

But when accidents do happen, or when a spouse needs surgery, a child is ill, or a parent has passed away, you'll find a Chaplain.

For 233 years, the Navy Chaplain Corps has done so much more than perform divine services aboard ships: they've been an operational necessity for history's greatest naval force. As we work for a more stable, more secure, more prosperous future, we need them now as never before. To all Chaplains past and present, Happy Anniversary, and thank you for all you do for our country and our Navy.

Honor All Who Have Served

Patriotism was running high as more than 1,200 people flocked to the Kitsap County Fairgrounds Pavilion for the annual Veterans Day Ceremony on Nov. 11 orchestrated by Earle & Sandra Smith of the Bremerton-Olympic Peninsula Navy League.

The doors opened at 9 a.m. for viewing the West Sound Military VehiclePreservation Club's antique military vehicles display. More than 40 veteran and fraternal service organizations had booths set up for browsing.

Rear Adm. James Symonds, Commander, Navy Region Northwest delivered remarks as he spoke directly to the veterans in the audience about the great sacrifices they have endured. RADM Symonds introduced the keynote speaker, Rear Adm. Timothy Giardina, Commander, Submarine Group Trident. His remarks echoed the long history of contributions of Veterans and the great strides democracy has made in the world. He said that one of the biggest challenges was during World War II when American democracy withstood a strong resistance, but prevails today 50 years later.

"Today as I speak, more than 150,000 U.S. service men and women, active, reserve and guard are away from their homes and loved ones serving in the Middle East and elsewhere fighting against terror," Giardina stated. "They serve both as war fighters, peacekeepers and re-builders.

They serve on and under the water, and they lock point in small mountain villages and lonely valleys tracking down their enemies and helping communities devastated by years of war and terror and abuse. In conclusion, Giardina asked the veterans in the audience to carry out a simple task. "I ask you to please share your stories with others. Let everyone know what you have done so that they can see the many faces of military service and appreci-

ate the personal service of their neighbors and friends, Giardina said. So we end where we began to today. We honor those who have worn the cloth of our nation, who have given their all in war and in peace and we also remember and support and thank the families. We honor the past while guaranteeing the future."

At the ceremony's conclusion, the reverberation of a21-gun salute echoed through the pavilion, it was washed away gently by the echoing sound of taps performed by two buglers from opposite ends of the building.
