Senior Navy Officials Brief Defense Secretary On Shipbuilding Issues

Meeting Was Informational, Not About Decisions

The Navy's senior civilian and uniformed leadership recently met with Defense Secretary Donald Rumsfeld regarding shipbuilding, but it was an informational briefing no decisions were made, sources told *Inside the Navy*.

Navy Secretary Gordon England, Chief of Naval Operations Adm. Vern Clark, Marine Corps Commandant Gen. Michael Hagee and Navy acquisition executive John Young were among the top naval officials present at the meeting with Rumsfeld Nov. 19.

Rumsfeld was accompanied by Defense Department Comptroller Tina Jonas and Ken Krieg, head of the DOD's office of program analysis and

evaluation.

In recent months, the Navy has been heavily criticized by Congress and the shipbuilding industry because the service's proposed fiscal year 2006 budget, which it submitted to OSD in August, would dramatically slash shipbuilding. The proposed budget would spend about \$6 billion to buy only four new vessels (*Inside the Navy*, Aug. 9, p1). Behind closed doors, Navy officials are also rethinking the size and composition of the fleet, moving toward a goal of fewer than 375 ships.

At the Nov. 19 meeting, England and Clark presented the Navy's briefing to Rumsfeld. The Navy did not request any decisions of Rumsfeld at the meeting and none were made, naval and industry sources said. The meeting was an informational briefing, not a discussion about how the Navy's shipbuilding plan might be revised, sources said.

Navy leaders explained the service is controlling manpower cost growth by reducing Navy end strength while increasing readiness funding to support forward-deployed forces. Further, Navy leaders explained the service is transforming ship maintenance and crew training to ensure the fleet is able to surge when needed. And Navy leaders noted each ship in the FY-06 budget is a part of a new class, only one of which is in the water (the service recently took delivery of the first Virginia-class submarine).

It was noted that ship investment is a Navy priority but that investment accounts are the only place the Navy can turn to pay large, unplanned bills. The Navy's proposed FY-06 shipbuilding plan was presented not as what the Navy Department wants, but as the logical result of new capabilities, overall affordability and funding rules that affect shipbuilding.

The naval source said the meeting went well, noting Rumsfeld was impressed enough to request a paper to discuss key points of the briefing at a higher level.

Reservists Called Up To Serve As Customs Inspectors

Roughly 450 reservists were called up on or around Nov. 30 for duty as customs inspectors in support of Operation Iraqi Freedom. The mobilized sailors will serve as Department of Defense customs inspectors at sea and in airports in Iraq and Kuwait, according to the Naval Expeditionary Logistics Support Force, based at Cheatham Annex in Williamsburg, Va.

The customs inspection mission, a new one for the Reserves, involves inspecting military gear being returned to the United States for disease-bearing dirt and smuggled contraband.

The mobilized sailors will take over the job from Air Force personnel who've performed the mission for the past year.

The reservists will be briefed and medically screened and then undergo six weeks of training at Cheatham Annex. The training will include a combat skills refresher course and customs inspection certification. The reservists are on one-year orders and could be extended for an additional year, officials said.

Reservists are being called up from about 60 Reserve centers nationwide.

Currently, about 485 reservists from NAVELSF Forward Group Bravo are deployed in Iraq and Kuwait.
