We are all missing our Past President, Stan Mack, now that he is residing in Oregon, but Stan remains a member of our Council and on our Board of Directors as Past President. A little about Stan – Stan is married to Jane and has three children, Melissa (32), David (29) and Peter (24) and until recently resided in Kingston. Stan graduated from the U. S. Naval Academy with a BS degree in 1972 where he studied Physics. He graduated from the U.S. Naval War College in 1997 with a MA degree where his field of study was National Security/Strategic Studies. His specialized experience ranged from Operation Officer for Pacific Strategic Submarine Force, Command of Nuclear Submarines to Allied Naval Operations (Mediterranean).

Stan spent 31 years in the Navy and retired as Captain with a Nuclear Propulsion/Submarine specialty. He was Chief of Staff of Submarine Group Nine when he retired in June of 2003. Squadron Engineer for Submarine Development Squadron 12 – both in Groton, CT.; among a number of other assignments.

Captain's Corner - Navy Mission/Navy Pride"

Hello Navy Leaguers! Hope you are having a wonderful 2008. Whales in Sinclair Inlet, eagles on the mast of the TURNER JOY, a marina about to open to hundreds of boats,

what could be better than the beauty of Puget Sound, the Olympic Mountains and the Pacific Northwest?

I thought this month might be a good time to reflect for a few minutes regarding the mission, the value, the source of pride that constitutes the foundation of the United States Navy. We are a service that provides a unique opportunity for global engagement through exercising teamwork with our allies, by providing relief to challenged nations, by deterring war in regions of instability and by extracting the cells of terrorism with surgical strike capability in regions where they may falsely think that they are beyond our watch. The United States Navy provides global presence to keep our nation safe.

When we deploy, not a cruise goes by where we are not engaged in multinational exercises to build our relationship with our coalition partners. During this past deployment the JOHN C. STENNIS had the opportunity to work with vessels from France, Britain, Australia and Japan, as well as providing air support to the 37 partner nations that make up the International Security Assistance Force (ISAF) in Afghanistan. We also had the opportunity to participate in community relations projects in Dubai, Singapore and Hong Kong, where hundreds of Sailors supported local hospitals and schools. But of course the brightest example of humanitarian assistance/disaster relief was USS ABRAHAM LINCOLN responding to the Tsunami in Indonesia. Making friends encourages peace, deters aggression and helps keep our country safe.

Whether the mission is in support of combat operations or coalition exercises, the thing that makes our Naval Services unique is our geographic flexibility. To move 65 combat aircraft, plus their fuel, ordnance, spare parts and repair capabilities from a mission in Afghanistan

to support a mission in Iraq would be impossible, but for the geographic flexibility of the Navy's flagships - the Aircraft Carriers. These mobile bases of operation bring phenomenal combat power, greater than the power of most nation states from geographic region to geographic region in a matter of days. And that's just the tip of the iceberg as our Cruisers, Destroyers and Submarines bring the capability to monitor, assist and counter enemy actions across broad stretches of regions where stability is threatened. Our Navy is very engaged at the front lines in a very positive mission of sewing regional stability and security that holds our planet's future secure.

The other very significant advantage enjoyed by the Naval services is the very small footprint we require ashore. Some cultures enjoy interacting with other nations ashore, but there are also many cultures that view a large footprint on their sovereign territory as a negative thing. By sailing the high seas and supporting our missions from over the horizon, we have the ability to influence regional security without aggravating our host nations/allies overseas. Maximum power, significant influence effecting security, while preserving the sovereignty of our friends and allies, that is a great attribute of our Navy.

This is a time in our history where Naval Leadership is making a remarkable impact on our nation's security across the entire planet. The Chairman of the Joint Chiefs, ADM Mullen, the Commander of Pacific Command (covering the Pacific Ocean and most of Asia), ADM Keating, the Commander of Central Command (the Middle East), ADM Fallon, Commander of Southern Command (South America), ADM Stavridis. Navy leaders who are winning the global war on terror and preserving the security of our nation. I don't think there's ever been a time in history when the Department of Defense (all services) have been led by this many Naval Officers. This is a testimony to the power of the United States Navy.

Accelerate your life! Go Navy!


Dear Bremerton-Olympic Peninsula Council Officers and Board of Directors:

Blaine Resident Becomes Sea Cadet Commander at Age 74

There are 11 general orders in the U.S. Navy. Blaine resident Ed Mitchell, 74, can recite all of them in less than five seconds from memory. What makes Mitchell's feat impressive is the fact he's retired from another branch of military service - the U.S. Army National Guard. Mitchell said his 34 years as a non-commissioned officer continue to serve him well in his new role teaching youth.

The Sea Cadets are a nationwide organization that helps youth realize personal success and achievement

through nautical training. They are instructed by active, reserve and retired naval personnel, senior cadets and adult volunteers who devote time to the activity. Young men and women ages 13 to 18 years learn about the sea-going military services, community service, citizenship, discipline and teamwork.

Specifically, Mitchell is now a lieutenant in command of the Poseidon Division that currently trains out of the American Wings Air Museum located at the Anoka County-Blaine Airport (Janes Field).

Mitchell's official retirement from the National Guard date was Nov. 15, 1992. "That's what my discharge papers read," he said. Nevertheless, as the years rolled by, Mitchell began searching for another way to put his service to use. That led him to volunteering with the U.S. Naval Sea Cadet Corps. "I was just sitting at home with a ton of knowledge," Mitchell said. "It's been a pleasure and a real opportunity to take what I've learned and share it with eager young people," he added "I'm learning the U.S. Navy ways, too."

A Veteran's Memorial in Silverdale



Did you know? Kitsap County Veterans Memorial on the northwest side of the Silverdale Waterfront Park, next to the gazebo, is a unique tribute to Veterans who have served in the branches of our armed services and a really cool place to explore with your children. The Kitsap County Veterans Memorial was built with the joint efforts of the Silverdale Sunrise Rotary Club, the Kitsap County Homebuilders Association, and Kitsap County businesses. The Memorial includes emblems of the Army; Air Force; Navy; Coast Guard; Marine Corps; and Merchant Marines set inside a curved wall facing the water. Incorporated into the surrounding grass is a concrete global pattern that's over 50 feet. Challenge your children to hop from South America to Kansas, then to Russia and end up on Africa. The Memorials purpose, according to the Kitsap County Veterans Memorial website <http://www.kcvm.org/>, "is to be a place where individuals may reflect or

where groups may hold functions and gatherings to remember those that have served our country." The park has other attractions – sidewalk impressions, a colorful play toy, a huge rock to play on and great hills to roll down. Take a walk out on the floating piers, sit and watch into the water for an incredible sealife community right under you.

The Memorial Maintenance Fund is established to ensure that the flags are always in good shape and that the Memorial is well maintained. Contributions are accepted by the Silverdale Sunrise Rotary and the Home Builders Association of Kitsap County. See the website for details.

Driving Directions:

Silverdale Waterfront Park is located in Old Silverdale. From Highway 3 take the Newberry Hill exit. Go east into Silverdale. Turn right at Byron Street. The Park is at the end of Byron Street on the right. Silverdale Waterfront Park is open year round, dawn to dusk.
