## "Semper Paratus" since 1790

Through dozens of conflicts, thousands of disasters, and numerous name changes, the U.S. Coast Guard has been an integral part of our Nation's armed services since 1790.

Secretary of the Treasury Alexander Hamilton formed the Revenue Marine on August 4th of that year, after the last of the Continental Navy's ships had been auctioned off and the Continental Marines disbanded. Established to enforce customs laws, that original force of 10 cutters (designated so from their size and rigging, and because British customs patrol boats at the time were called cutters) and their crews were our young nation's only armed maritime service for eight years.

In 1915 the Revenue Marine, by then sometimes known as the Revenue Cutter Service, merged with the U.S. Life-Saving Service to become the U.S. Coast Guard. In 1939, the U.S. Lighthouse Service also merged with the Coast Guard, as did the Bureau of Marine Inspection and Navigation in 1942. In 1967, the Guard came under the newly-created Department of Transportation, and in 2003, changed again to the Department of Homeland Security. During both World Wars, the Guard came under the Department of the Navy.

The Coast Guard has been well represented in the Northwest since the 1850's, and our Region could claim the Coast Guard as its own. Revenue Cutters participated in the Puget Sound War and so-called Pig War of the 1850's. The Light House Service began maintaining aids to navigation in Northwest waters around the same time. Later in that century, Seattle was the summer home of the Revenue Cutter BEAR, and her legendary Captain Michael Healy. BEAR, and similar cutters, were some of the first representatives of the U.S. government in the newly acquired Alaska territory, charting waters, enforcing laws, and



saving lives in the last frontier.

\*\*Cle Elum, WA is the hometown and final resting place of the Coast Guard's only Medal of Honor recipient, Signalmen 1st Class Douglas Munro. Munro was killed by enemy fire in 1942 at Guadalcanal while rescuing Marines from an overrun beachhead.

\*\*The National Motor Lifeboat School in Illwaco, Washington is the world's premier learning institution for rough water rescue.

\*\*The Coast Guard routinely performs some of the most amazing rescues, in some of the world's most challenging conditions, in the Bering Sea and at the mouth of the Columbia River.

\*\*All Polar Icebreakers, as well as High and Medium Endurance Cutters, Buoy Tenders, Patrol Boats, and several types of aircraft, call our Region home.

The Navy and Coast Guard have worked together since 1798, and nowhere is that relationship as strong as in our Region: Coast Guard personnel and vessels are stationed at Naval Station Everett and Naval Base Kitsap; Coast Guardsmen and Sailors work side by side in the Joint Harbor Operations Center in Seattle; our services routinely work together in search and rescue missions, and during disaster response like the December 2007 floods. Few partnerships are as beneficial to the people of the Northwest as that between these two maritime services.

The Navy League has a distinguished history of support to the Coast Guard. As the Coast Guard marks their 219th Birthday, take time to remember the Coast Guardsmen who gave the ultimate sacrifice, whether fighting enemies or saving friends. And if you're able, take the time to thank a Coastie for remaining true to the motto, Semper Paratus, Always Ready, for whenever and whatever their country needs.

## CO of USS Alabama Brings New Insight to August Luncheon



The USS Alabama recently completed a two-year refueling overhaul at Puget Sound Naval Shipyard. During their stay, the crew participated in events like Great White Fleet, Sea Fair, and Trident 100th Tour. CMDR Todd Massidda, said "I appreciate the support from my crew and all the ships in the area."

After the overhaul work was completed the two crews had seven months to get the ship recertified. The DASO 20 (Demonstration and Shakedown Operations) included 15 major inspections and recertification's being done. Vice Admiral Locklear, Director of Navy Staff, and other dignitaries were onboard for the ship's launch in February. This is a

significant return to sea as one quarter of the ship's lifetime has been spent at the shipyard.

Gary Gunderson, Vice President of BROLPN Navy League, presented CMDR Massidda with a commemorative mug and a CD copy of Pearl Harbor by Don Green, Pearl Harbor survivor and Navy League member. Bob Aronson, President of Pacific Northwest Chapter, Naval Submarine League, presented CMDR Massidda with a commemorative coin and book.

## 2nd Annual Operation Holiday Spirit

BROLPN is excited to kick off our 2nd annual Operation Holiday Spirit project! This year we will be helping the Kitsap County families of Individual Augmentees, the "forgotten" families.

## Did You Know?



This is submarine “Typhoon” as it was called in NATO documents or “Shark” as it was called in Russia. It is considered to be the biggest submarine in the world, with over than 170 meters (515 feet) long and 23 meter (70 feet) wide. It can carry 20 ballistic nuclear missiles and there were only six of those built. Only 3 left intact, but are staying

now out of service with armament control blocks detached according to the agreement between USSR and USA signed by M. Gorbachev. Without those they are way too peaceful.
