Northwest Navy Notes: October 2008 - Happy Birthday

I begin this message by wishing our United States Navy a very Happy Birthday. 233 years of excellence, honor, and service to the world is certainly an amazing accomplishment. Each year as we celebrate our birthday, we take the time to look back at our impressive history and consider how it has shaped us into the Navy we are today.

The Navy's reason for being, really the reason that nations from antiquity to the present have built and maintained navies, is to project power. By their very nature, sea services are the military arm most capable of expanding a country's frontiers, of protecting her borders, citizens and commerce... of keeping wars "away games." It's no coincidence that history's greatest nations have also put history's greatest navies to sea.

This year marks a special anniversary in naval history, because one hundred years ago, Sailors and ships of the Great White Fleet proved to the world that America now had a Navy capable of global power projection, and that we were now surely counted among those "great nations." Their deployment signaled America's emergence as a world power, and provided a diplomatic message of peace and partnership to countries around the globe. We continue to build on the legacy born of the Great White Fleet, projecting power around the globe ...

To help celebrate this 233rd birthday of our service, I want to talk about some of the ways our Navy today is staying true to that legacy. We're working with partners to deter aggressors and prevent war, securing the world's waterways for commerce, and providing aid where needed to victims of natural disasters and war.

We're fighting in Operations Enduring and Iraqi Freedom, on the sea and on the land. We're also looking to the future, stopping wars before they start, increasing stability of the maritime commons and the world. The USS Peleliu Expeditionary Strike Group is conducting maritime security operations, in the Red Sea, Arabian Sea, and Arabian Gulf. Riverine Squadron 3 is conducting combat



operations on lakes and waterways throughout Al Anbar, Iraq. USS Decatur and USS Thatch are supporting a task force in the Persian Gulf. The USS Ronald Reagan Carrier Strike Group is operating in the Gulf of Oman and is supporting coalition ground forces in Afghanistan. As we have for 233 years, we're projecting power from the sea to fight and win

our nation's wars.

Today, as many of you know, we also have Sailors deployed as what we call Individual Augmentees, or IAs. Our Sailors are phenomenal people, with phenomenal skills, and many of those skills are as relevant on land as they are at sea. So, many Sailors augment ground forces... they serve with Army units and provide needed but lacking capabilities. More than 72,000 Sailors have served an IA tour. We have submarine engineers on civil reconstruction teams, naval aviators doing counter-IED patrols, Navy police working terrorist detainee operations... Today, about 15,000 Sailors are serving on the ground in the Middle East. They've got training and experience in projecting power, and they're doing that wherever they're needed.

People sometimes forget that the Navy mission is the same whether we are a country at war or at peace. When conflicts are resolved, we don't pack up and go home until the next need arises ... we are a persistent global presence and we never stop working, day or night. We are present and prepared to project power when necessary.

While we participate in current conflicts, we're also the service that must be looking beyond the horizon, recognizing future threats; or even better, turning potential threats into current opportunities. Our Maritime Strategy states that preventing wars is as important as winning wars. Prevention may come from hard power ... in the form of a naval air strike on a terrorist training camp. Or it may come from soft power....a team of Navy doctors and nurses stopping a cholera epidemic in a developing nation.

A carrier strike group can deter a government or terrorist group from disrupting our national security by virtue of its deterrent strength... although it can affect stability and peace by reaching out with a helping hand. Today, we are working with our partners and allies to address the roots of conflict – from economic instability, to illegal trafficking, to refugee movements, to environmental disasters and endemic diseases. Just last month we provided more than 115 tons of assistance with our Coast Guard partners to the Republic of Georgia. Our hospital ship USNS Mercy provided humanitarian assistance to nearly 11,500 people in Micronesia.

Today, we have SEABEEs in Haiti, helping the poorest nation in the western hemisphere recover from Hurricane damage. Today, our Fleet is operating with the navies of Pacific nations to halt the proliferation of weapons of mass destruction on the seas. Our ships in the Caribbean are regularly hauling in tons of cocaine. We are working with coastal African nations to stop the nearly \$1B in losses due to illegal fishing. And, we're fighting piracy off the coast of Somalia.

Whether using our power to fight wars or preserve peace, to punish or to save, the fundamental strengths of our Navy remain as they've been for 233 years.

With naval forces, you do not have to establish a base, you do not have to negotiate for space, you do not have to build extra infrastructure, you do not have to ask permission, and you do not have to infringe on another's nation's sovereignty.

Today U.S. Naval forces are operating on the ground, on the sea, under the sea, in the air, and in space. Our presence, our maneuverability, our strength, and our ability to operate across the spectrum of operations in war and peace are what made our naval forces so valuable in 1775, in 1908, and today. Make no mistake, we are fighting wars, fighting criminals, terrorists, and all others that threaten our liberty and prosperity. Still, our efforts focus on opportunities, not threats... on optimism, not fear... and on confidence, not doubt.

Today, 233 years later after our Navy began, we watch as our past influences our present, and as our present helps shape our future.

Happy birthday to the United States Navy!

Council Turns 60 Years Old

Bremerton-Olympic Peninsula Council celebrates sixty years of honoring and supporting the Sea Services. The very first business meeting was held in 1948 under the leadership of President J. Edward Adams. Perhaps some of our members remember the beginning of the Council and would share their stories.

1948 was a memorable year. I remember the Freedom Train arriving in San Francisco and hundreds of people crowding around to see it. Nikita Khrushchev became the leader of the Soviet Union. Congress passed the Marshall Aid Act to rehabilitate war-torn Europe. Philips began experimental TV broadcasting and ABC entered network TV. Andrew Lloyd Webber, composer of Phantom of the Opera and Cats was born and so was Al Gore.

Sixty years later, our Council is still strong and growing. We now have over 560 members, the largest Council in Washington. We have over 35,000 men and women directly linked to the military living in our area. We have developed a strong, positive working relationship with the civic and business community and are pleased to also have a positive working relationship with many of the local, state and national political leaders. These links have not come easily and need constant attention. As members, we need to become more actively involved in Council activities.

and respectfully waved when they recognized the significance of the escort.


Upon reaching Tahoma National

USS Abraham Lincoln (CVN 72) returns to its homeport in Everett, Oct. 12 after a successful seven-month deployment supporting Operations Enduring Freedom & Iraqi Freedom, maritime security, and coalition operations in the U.S. 5th Fleet Area of Responsibility.

USS Rodney M. Davis (FFG 60) departed its homeport of Naval Station Everett Oct. 20 for a regularly scheduled deployment. The Oliver Hazard Perry Class guided missile frigate is scheduled to deploy to the southern Pacific Ocean to participate in a counter narcotics mission alongside international partners and the U.S. Coast Guard. .

During the week of Oct. 6, USS Momsen (DDG 92) conducted Tiger Cruise as it transited back to its Everett home port following a nearly sevenmonth deployment with the USS Abraham Lincoln Strike Group. 64 Momsen family and friends embarked on board the destroyer in Pearl Harbor.


2008 Veterans Day Ceremony **Tuesday, Nov 11**
